

## University Hospital 2018 Public Reporting of Oncology Community Outreach Summary

Each calendar year, the Commission on Cancer requires that the Oncology Committee at University Hospital provides a Community Cancer Screening event and a Community Cancer Educational and Prevention event. This year, an event entitled See Test & Treat, sponsored by the College of American Pathologist Foundation, New Jersey Medical School and University Hospital offered free cervical cancer screening and education services.

<b>Summary of Results</b>	A total of 41 screening Pap Smears completed, 8 were abnormal and two had positive HPV results. The Clinical Care Coordinator scheduled patients with abnormal results for a consult with the gynecologist. A positive finding would result in the patient being scheduled for further management and treatment options.	A total of 18 participants attended the presentation entitled Cervical Cancer Prevention and HPV. A pre and posttest was provided which demonstrated that the participants were aware that the HPV virus is associated with cervical cancer, Pap smear testing are effective in screening for cervical cancer and cervical cancer can be prevented. The presentation had an available Spanish translator who catered to the Spanish speaking community members.
<b>Effectiveness</b>	Event was very successful. Recommendations for improvement includes being prepared to accommodate walk-ins. Work on creative ideas to decrease the no-show rate. Reaching women who haven't had a Pap smear in the past 5 years.	The cervical cancer education and prevention sessions brought awareness to the patients regarding the importance of getting screened. Although the presentation was translated into Spanish, there was a disconnect with some of the information translated. It was noted that the Spanish speaking population did not have an impressive improvement between the pre-test and the post-test. Recommendation for a better translation



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		system will be considered.
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
